Thanks for your interest in writing an opinion piece for The Post-Standard. If you can write well and you have something to say, I'd love to give you a chance. It enriches our coverage and gives you a great reason to do some polished, thoughtful essay writing.

A submitted article should be 400 to 500 words long. It can be a persuasive piece about an educational, social or school-based issue that somehow affects you; a humorous take-off on something affecting young people generally; or a personal story that might illustrate a larger issue about life as a student or teen-ager. If it's important to you and you feel a need to let people know about it, it's probably a good topic.

This is a competitive process; only the best will get published. Some topics are better than others, of course, so if you want to discuss article ideas before you begin writing, please give me a call at 470-3250. If your essay is selected, I will ask you to come to our downtown office so we can photograph you in our studio. There is no deadline, but articles that arrive sooner have a better chance of being published by the end of the school year. Essays may be edited to make them shorter, to make the wording more clear, or to correct factual errors. I want your opinions to come through loud and clear.
